INTRODUCTION

Jagriti Child and Youth Concern Nepal (JCYCN) is a non-governmental, non-political and non-profit making social organization established by dedicated youths for the protection and promotion of child and youth rights in Nepal through advocacy, research and campaign.

As a part of human rights protection and promotion, JCYCN has observed and monitored many human rights violation cases especially of children during the ten years insurgency in Nepal and it has also initiated various campaigns in the country for generating a conducive environment for children and youths. In a post-war period and during state rebuilding, JCYCN believes in the essential need of participation of all caste, creed, race, age, gender and ethnicity, as the voice of each individual is very important. Therefore, committed towards its vision, mission and goals, JCYCN always stands ahead to raise key issues and ensure youth and children's participation in various level of the state building mechanism.

The structural profile of JCYCN consists of 40 general members comprising of 21 males and 19 females of different cultural and racial background to maintain inclusiveness and equality. Currently, we have 14 youths who are working under various capacities as full time staffs, many who are rendering their services to the organization voluntarily and according to their skills, 30 peer educators (adolescent girls) and 50 youth volunteers that come into action when necessary. Given the financial barriers, JCYCN aims to provide network support and professional opportunities for volunteers as a way to encourage and respect their contributions.

HISTORY

The history of JCYCN can be traced back to the formation of Jagriti Child Club Nepal (JCCN) in 1992, which is the first children's club in Nepal without any external support. There was no provision for registering children's clubs in the country until 1998 as the Nepali legislative development lacked recognition of child's rights to register anything due to their lack of legal citizenship at the time. That changed when a group of enthusiastic children registered a case in the Supreme Court in Jan 1999 and in the Ministry of Home demanding their right to open a child club in Nepal. After three years of debate and persistent advocacy, the Supreme Court of Nepal finally gave its verdict in favor of the children and JCCN in July 2001. The verdict given by the Supreme Court of Nepal is such a progressive landmark that it has been studied with greater importance by Law students in renowned colleges of Tribhuvan University. Since then, JCCN has received legal permission to organize programs for groups of children and form child clubs in Nepal. In addition; at present there are 23000 child clubs in Nepal which are legally registered. JCCN has also received positive feedback from various communities and many have been influenced by its initiatives. As the first child club of Nepal, JCCN did a number of imperative works including campaigns and advocacy programs on child related topics such as quality education, sanitation and health concerns, sustainability and environment, child marriage, decision making participation, and so on.

After gaining valuable expertise, the same children of JCCN who had by now crossed the age of 18, felt the need for a youth forum to implement their skills and knowledge for the betterment of society. This led to the formation of JCYCN, a child and youth NGO registered in Nawalparasi on October 3rd, 2004, but that has been working in the field of child and youth since 2001.

Since its establishment, JCYCN has been working on the principles of value and right based approach. The following are the regular topics for JCYCN programs:

6. Disaster Risk Reduction/Management and Climate Change (response and capacity building)
7. Child and Youth in Peace Building (awareness generation)

10. Promotion of the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs)
11. Networking (Local to National and International levels)

1. ADVOCACY & LOBBYING

JCYCN supports the empowerment of youth and children to bring positive changes in policymaking level. The organization coordinates and participates in diverse campaigns, public awareness and training programs concerning key issues that affect child and youth rights. Examples are as follows:

1. Advocacy on the United Nations Sustainable Development Goals (SDG), focusing on those related to child and youth.
2. Advocacy for the fulfillment of the commitments made by the country in the International and National platforms.
3. Advocacy on safe and child friendly as well as environment friendly rural/municipalities, promoting CFLG strategy and the “Children as a Zone of Peace” movement simultaneously.
4. Lobbying for youth policy formulation and implementation (UNSC Resolution 2250), playing an eminent role for implementation Youth Vision 2025
5. Supporting the National Youth Council for the implementation of National Youth Policy to ensure the appropriate position of young people from Local to the National level.
6. Raising voice against human rights’ violation; special attention given to caste and gender-based violence, and girls child rights (including early marriage and violence against girls);
7. Advocacy on health issues such as mental and reproductive health focused on youth and child.
8. Advocacy for youth friendly and accessible Sexual and Reproductive Health and Rights (SHRH) provision.

2. HUMAN RIGHTS MONITORING

Nepal has experienced many bloodshed and critical time in its history. During these critical times, JCYCN has continued to monitor human rights violation cases, constitutional assembly election, peoples' movement, rescued injured people, and provided humanitarian support to them and other victims of natural disasters. In various occasions, time and frame in collaboration with CZOPP, JCYCN had organized programs on Children as Zone of Peace. Moreover, we have worked together with the National Human Rights Commission, the Humanitarian Accountability Monitoring Initiative (HAMI), and other relevant organizations on the topic.

3. UNIVERSAL PERIODIC REVIEW

JCYCN has been working on the United Nations Universal Periodic Review (UPR) for the 2⁹ cycle on 2015 as secretariat by coordinating different organization in Nepal under the funding and supervision of PAX Romana. Concerning the human rights situation in Nepal, we collected information to the UPR 23rd session in November 2015. JCYCN is the overall leading organization of this coalition with the collective efforts of AYON, AAPRD, NAFAN, Samata Foundation, PNCC, FMCH, CISD Nepal and ITEEN - over the contribution of 75 local organizations to elaborate the report. Although we contributed to the 8 main thematic topics, JCYCN was the leading organization on the topic of “Girl Child Rights” issues.

4. GIRL CHILD RIGHTS & PROTECTION

Since 2012, JCYCN has been organizing campaigns to promote the rights of Girl Child as part of the Asian Girl Campaign being financially assisted by The Garden of Hope Foundation, Taiwan. The campaigns include the local and national celebration of Girl Child Day, girl's empowerment through sports, end of child marriage and violence against girls. Moreover, we organized the Girls Summit in Nawalparasi District in 2017 A.D together with various relevant partners and media supporters. We are also board member of Men Engage Alliance in Nepal towards gender equality. Further, under recommendations of JCYCN, Ms. Shraddha Mahat has been chosen as the Asian Girl Ambassador for the year 2014, Ms. Bipina Sharma in 2015 and Ms. Ashma Aryal in 2018 have been awarded Asian Girl Human Rights award.

JCYCN strives to continue its efforts of protecting the rights of girl child through empowerment and participation. It has also been working in collaboration with her pad to ensure the Menstrual Hygiene among young girls in school and home. Similarly, JCYCN took the lead of province level Girl Summit 2018 of Gandaki Province and Province no 5. In addition it has also been working with 30 adolescent girls under 'Girls' Empowerment' project.

5. QUALITY EDUCATION & SUPPORT

Since 2014, JCYCN has teamed up with *Hoste Hainse* to provide educational support to 70 students in Nawalparasi. We have also been providing support in collaboration with the Asian Resource Foundation Thailand and Nepal, each year providing educational materials for 300 students. JCYCN is also aiding on the reconstruction of a school affected by the earthquake in Rasuwa District funded by Indigo Fund UK, and has already provide support to 800 students in the district together with Nepal hilfe B.H Ger-many. This last partnership supported two Temporary Learning Centers in Sindhupalchok, stationary for students in Nawalparasi, with CWIN support for 300 children. The educational programs are mainly comprised of awareness classes for children and orientation for teachers to make schools more child-friendly. Till the date, we have provided education programs and material to 14 schools in Rasuwa District with support of Cedar Fund Hong Kong and 6 School Child Clubs, and constructed 4 roomed ECD building in Rasuwa and Devchuli, Nawalparashi with the assistance of Indigo Children's fund.

6. HUMANITARIAN SUPPORT FOR THE VICTIMS OF NATURAL DISASTER

On 25th April 2015, Nepal was victim of a devastating earthquake at 7.9 rector scale magnetite. Casualties were over 8800 people; more than 23 thousands were physical-ly injured; 5 hundred thousand were home-less; and more than 2 hundred thousand houses were partially damaged. On that critical situation, JCYCN mobilized around 300 youths to carry on with the rescues, collect the relief materials and help in the distribution. We are regularly updating the information on earthquake consequences and humanitarian support for the victims. During this critical situation we were successful to reach the 5000 households of 7 highly earthquake affected districts and distribute food and non-food items like blankets, educational materials, medicine, wheelchairs, etc. Along with that, we have been able to held health camps reaching to 3000 population who need basic health check-ups, besides reaching up to 5000 households through psychosocial counseling for the earthquake affected population. In addition, JCYCN has constructed 5 TLCs at Rasuwa and Sindhupalchok in collaboration

with other organizations. Other natural disasters as floods and landslides are also a concern of JCYCN, especially in Nawalparasi district. It worked with Cedar fund for providing humanitarian assistance.

Similarly, it was also successful in supporting 125 household of Rautahat district after the massive flood in Terai in 2017 A.D.

7. ENVIRONMENT & CLIMATE CHANGE

As part of its strategy to support environmental protection, justice and sustainable development activities, JCYC Nepal has been involved in Community Managed Disaster Risk Reduction (CMDRR) Forum Nepal since 2010, advocating and lobbying on various environmental protection and Climate Change Adoption issues. In 2014, JCYCN launched a campaign for fire disaster preparedness and plastic free village campaign.

Every summer Terai region endures forest fires and during the monsoon season, they are disrupted by floods. In response to this, JCYCN has provided humanitarian support to the victims and organized awareness programs such as plantation of trees. In collaboration with Youth and Sports Ministry and Concern Universal - Bangladesh, we have provided training to 200 candidates on climate change, disaster risk management and emergency response in Nawalparasi, Rasuwa and Kathmandu.

8. HEALTH & SANITATION

Health and sanitation is one of the crucial factors that determine the overall growth of any child. Keeping this in mind, JCYCN has been part of various sanitation campaigns. Hand washing project implemented in Nawalparasi district can be considered as an example. SRHR is another important issue covered by JCYCN. As sexual and reproductive health and rights still seems a taboo in our context, JCYCN has been part of various advocacy and awareness programs on these matters.

9. YOUTH SAFE MIGRATION, TRAINING & CAPACITY BUILDING

JCYCN has been working on capacity building programs for youths in some districts of Nepal. In this course, it has been encouraging the rural youths to develop their competencies, knowledge and experiences so that they become competitive. In 2007-2009, the organization conducted 'Youth for Peace Workshop' involving participants from many South Asian countries. The training was conducted in collaboration with the Ministry of Youth and Sports in the Youth Partnership Program. By recommendation of JCYCN, 50 youths have been to various countries for trainings and workshops. Under the safe migration topic, JCYCN recently started a new project in collaboration with Caritas Nepal aiming to ensure safe and dignified migration for youths of 5 wards of Godawori municipality, Lalitpur. It's based on awareness campaigns regarding foreign employment and help to enhance youth skills and knowledge through vocational or technical trainings or by linking them with Council for Technical Education and Vocational Training. In 2017 A.D alone, JCYCN was able to impart vocational training to more than 100 youths. Similarly, it has been targeting the youths (willing to go aboard and who are back from aboard) and their families.

10. CHILDREN & YOUTH PARTICIPATION IN PEACE BUILDING

JCYCN has focused upon the children and youth in peace building since the day of its inception. In the years 2014/15, JCYCN was selected for Nepal Partnership for Children and Youth in Peace-building Consortium partners, which also includes Alliance for Peace (AfP), Save the Children (SC), Search for Common Ground (SfCG), World Vision International Nepal (WVIN), and Youth Network for Peace and Development (YNPD). The partnership has been able to publish a national evaluation report with major eight findings and recommendations, including a Peace Album Nepal with child and youth artistic contributions.

11. CFLG PROMOTION

In the late December of 2013, Pragatinagar VDC, now part of Devchuli Municipality, has been declared as Nepal's first VDC with Child Friendly Local Governance. Sunuwol Municipality of Nawalparasi district has also been declared as the first of Nepal with CFLG. Various municipalities of Nawalparasi district have adopted CFLG system and are in the process of being declared as CFLG municipality, attaining minimum indicators of CFLG based child rights. JCYCN is one of the major organizations working towards making Nawalparasi a CFLG district. Our activities focus mostly on educational support, awareness campaigns, trainings and construction of school buildings.

JCYCN is also the secretariat of National Child Friendly Local Governance Forum (CFLGF), which is a national coalition of youth organizations promoting CFLG working for ensuring the proper adaptation of CFLG as provisioned by CFLG National Strategy 2011 A.D. JCYCN has played a pivotal role in deceleration of Bhadrachhat Municipality, Ghodawari Municipality and Tokha Municipality as child friendly.

12. INTERNATIONAL & NATIONAL CELEBRATIONS

In addition, JCYCN regularly organizes seminars and rallies on various pertinent issues related to children and youth issues at local, national and international level. Examples are: Child Rights' Day, Peace Day, Youth Day, Girl Child Day, Human Rights Day, Environment Day, Migration Day, and many more. The organization has been a part of the secretariat of the national coalitions of various organizations for the days and event. On those occasions, we have also presented memorandum letters to the President, Prime Minister, Youth and Sports Minister, Science, Technology and Environmental Minister, Education Minister, political parties, and high-level policy makers, for enabling conducive environment regarding youth, children, and the above mentioned issues. These letters were designed to pressure the government for sustainable development of youth and child rights. JCYCN has also organized and participated in various rallies, discussions and campaigns in those commemorative dates. A recent example is the 16 Days Activism Campaign against Gender Based Violence.

14. NETWORK STRENGTHENING

JCYCN believes that unless like-minded organizations, both national and international, do not cooperate with each other, it cannot bring greater and lasting changes in society. Therefore, JCYCN prioritizes and develops networks with stakeholders, women, youth and child clubs from various levels. Although JCYCN was established in Nawalparashi, it is continuously working in different areas. Since 2001, we established good relationship with local stakeholders for joint work and collaboration, as well as with GOs, NGOs, and INGOs. As part of creating peace building networks, JCYCN has been a member of United Network of Young (UNOY) Peace Builders since 2013, and has been selected as International Steering Group (ISG) member representing South Asian Region for 2015-17. On the local level, JCYCN is part of the Association of Youth Organization Nepal (AYON), Social Protection Civil Society Network, Men Engage Alliance, and SDG Youth Alliance, NCPA, NAPA, IYF, DCIL, Consortium Nepal and Humanitarian Accountability Monitoring Initiative (HAMI) and more.

15. CHILDREN & YOUTH GROUPS NETWORKS

JCYCN also has the Jagriti Child Clubs in Nepal comprising more than 1,500 members. Apart from our 25 child clubs, we have contact with 30 other clubs. Being the initiators of more than 22 thousand child clubs in Nepal, we presently have network and attachment with more than 5,000 members and have joined hands to provide training programs on child rights, leadership, child participation and children as peace campaigns. Additionally, JCYCN has initiated a network of youth clubs and has been advocating for their rights at local and national level. Also, it has been lobbying for the policy formulation for the 12 NETWORKS 13 safeguard of their rights and meaningful participation. In collaboration with other organizations, JCYCN has been supporting the National Youth Assembly. Moreover, in 2016, our Board Member Deepak Bashyal was nominated as the International Youth Federation Representative in Nepal.

16. INTERNSHIP & VOLUNTEERING

Since 2001, JCYCN has been working to serve the society voluntarily. It is continuously working with modest funds and organizing programs in coordination with various organizations viz. NGOs, INGOs, GO's, and other institutions. In coordination with Volunteer Aid Nepal, JCYCN has also organized an orientation and training program to highlight the importance of volunteerism in various districts of Nepal. With our guidance and coordination, international friends are currently studying in different areas of Nepal and collecting information on different issues. JCYCN also accepts national and international interns to support our work between 3 to 6 months. We believe that it is a great opportunity for them to get more in touch with how a NGO works and its challenges as well to get

involved in the field of child and youth rights and peace building. For us, it is very valuable to receive such aid as new people bring more energy, idea and different points of view that can improve our organization. Our interns and volunteers have come from Bangladesh, Belgium, Brazil, India, Japan, Netherlands, Norway, Pakistan, Sri-Lanka, Thailand, United Kingdom and United States.

17. Disaster Risk Reduction/ Management (DRR/DRM)

JCYCN has been working in disaster response, and capacitating the youths, frontline workers and the representatives of newly formed local governance in various components of DRR. Similarly, it has also been involved in mainstreaming the issues of DRR in local planning process.

Currently, it is working on a joint partnership with the DRR section of UNICEF, Nepal to impart technical support in the facilitation of local planning process and mainstream DRR in local planning process and also capacitate the youths and stakeholders on DRM in 24 Municipalities and Village Municipals of Province no. 2. So far, we have reached more than 1000 newly elected political representatives.

18. Promotion of Sustainable Development Goals

JCYCN has been conducting various orientation sessions for young people for the promotion of Sustainable Development Goals, and capacitating the young people on the topic.

Lately, JCYCN in partnership with National Youth Council and many other relevant organizations has been conducting SDG schools and SDG talks every month. More than 1000 youths have been already benefitted through this program.
